#### **Information Items:**

 We are looking forward to celebrating Pink Shirt Day on Wednesday, Feb 22nd.
 Celebrated annually around the globe, Pink Shirt Day began in Nova Scotia in 2007 when two students, Travis Price and David Sheppard, took a stand against

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bullying after a new student was harassed for wearing pink. Their message grows stronger every year. In support of their message, we have a great celebration planned, including an engaging virtual presentation organized by the WITS Foundation (https://witsprogram.ca/) and WITS Up the Walrus, along with guest speaker Peter H. Reynolds, author of Be You, Say Something, The Dot, and many more inspirational stories. Following the presentation students will enjoy a pink frozen treat!! To add to the excitement students can look forward to:

- ✓ Signing our Pink Shirt Day Pledge generously donated by the Kennebecasis Regional Police Force
- ✓ Attending a K-2 or Grade 3-5 Sock Hop during their recess break.
- ✓ Working together as a class to guess how many pink pom poms are in Java's container.
- ✓ Purchasing a pink heart sticker OR having a pink heart stamped on their hand for the cost of .25 cents (or .50 cents if they would like both) in support of the Kids Help Phone.

We encourage both students and staff to wear as much pink to show their support of PINK SHIRT DAY!

- As you know we have three drop off zones for families who drive their children to school in the morning.
  - ✓ Option #1- Drop off circle in front of our gymnasium. Cars remain single file with children exiting passenger side of vehicle to the sidewalk that leads in front of the school to the playground. Adults remain in the vehicle and circle around to exit through the same driveway that you used for entry.
  - ✓ Option #2- Pull into a parking spot in front of Dreamland, park, exit vehicle and help/watch children as they enter through the gate directly to the playground. Be careful when backing out on to the roadway.
  - ✓ Option #3- Drive beyond the telephone pole at the end of the playground parking area, do a U-turn, and pull up parallel to the fence across from the grade 3-5 door (where games are painted on the pavement). Like Option #1, students exit the passenger side with adults remaining in the vehicle. Proceed back into traffic carefully.

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There have been safety concerns with families who use Option 3 but without following the safety protocols. Several people doing drop off do a u turn directly in front of the fence instead of proceeding to the location beyond Dreamland where it is safe to turn around. Vehicles also pull in and park perpendicular to the fence exiting their vehicle to help children. This blocks the third drop off zone and creates an unsafe traffic flow with people backing out of the parking spots in front of Dreamland, people backing out from this area where they shouldn't be parked, and those attempting to access and leave Option #3 appropriately.

School zones often have a lot of traffic, stressed drivers (especially if families are running late), and distracted children. Unsafe driving practices such as speeding, distracted driving, parking in the no parking zones, or not following other safety protocols can be a recipe for disaster in terms of child safety. It's simply not worth taking safety risks. Remember to keep calm, have patience, and always put the safety of children at the top of your list.

There are other options to driving your child to school. Taking the bus or having your child walk (or bike, weather permitting) reduce traffic around the school.
