How to Foster a Love of Writing at Home

Children are creative and imaginative and given the right tools, all students can begin to enjoy writing. The teachers at FES use many different tools and activities to help foster a love of writing and allow students to feel confident when taking risks with their writing. Below are several ways you can also encourage writing at home:

Have the Right Material- students feel more inspired to write when they have access to a variety of material. Stock up on blank cards, envelopes, fancy writing paper (free printables are found on the internet), journals as well as fun pencils and pens.

Encourage Oral Language- Before students can write a story, it is often beneficial to tell it. Playing games such as who can come up with the wildest story or story circle (where one person begins the story and the next person continues it) will create motivation when students are asked to put their ideas on paper.

Talk about Ideas- Much of the writing students will do in school will be based around personal experiences. Find time (perhaps over the weekend) to discuss some things your child has done or has an interest in that they might like to share with others.

Create Authentic Purposes for Writing- It is important that children see the value in writing and that they connect it to their own lives. Having your child help you write a shopping list or a thank you card when they receive a gift is a great way to do that.

Provide them with the Tools for Success- One great thing about a classroom is the environmental print that the students can see every day. Word walls and labels for example, help children feel confident as they try to spell unknown words. Although we can't replicate a classroom at home, asking your child's teacher for the words they have difficulty spelling is one way to help. If your child has access to these words, they won't be so concerned about the spelling and will have more opportunity to let their ideas flow.

Celebrate, **Celebrate!**- Every child should see themselves as an author. Allow them to read their writing out loud to you and celebrate their success (even the small ones).

Doing Math with Your Child

You are an important partner in your child's mathematics education. Finding ways to help your child think and talk about mathematics is an important key for unlocking his or her future success. Today, critical thinking, problem solving, reasoning ability and the ability to communicate mathematically are essential skills. These processes are the foundation of mathematics instruction.

Tips for Parents

- Build strong, positive attitudes about math. When children feel positively engaged and successful, they are more likely to stick with an activity or a problem to find a solution.
- Begin with activities that meet your child's level of mathematical understanding. Early success
 in solving problems will build your child's confidence. Gradually move to activities that provide
 more challenge for your child.

K-1 OUTCOMES for the month:

Students are expected to:

DOING:

- 1- Demonstrate personal space while standing still and moving.
- 2- Identify and move different body parts.
- 3- Move in the gym in a safe and controlled manner and stop in control with good balance.
- 4- Move through space while changing directions and being in control.
- 5-Toss and roll objects while standing still and moving.

KNOWING:

- 1- Keep my eye on an object in order to be able to catch it.
- 2- Look at my target when passing an object and make sure my partner is ready to receive.
- 3- Explain the importance of following rules in P.E. class.

VALUING:

- 3- Explain the importance of listening to directions and staying on task.

Students will be focusing on themes such as student listening, following directions and practicing safe routines for participation in the gym. Students will also focus on learning and practicing locomotor and manipulative skills when playing low organized games.

Students are expected to:

DOING

- 1- Demonstrate ways to send and receive an object with increasing accuracy, individually and with others.
- 2- Demonstrate basic motor skills and use these in games and sport activities.
- 3- Use basic offensive and defensive positions and strategies.
- 4- Be involved in fitness activities.

KNOWING


- 1 Show a knowledge and understanding of safety rules and procedures for activities.
- 2- Be aware of the 5 basic components of physical fitness such as aerobic endurance, muscular endurance, muscular strength, flexibility and body composition.

Speaking of Speech and Language...

(from the ASD-S Speech-language Pathology Department)

Practicing Language Skills in the Car

The car is a great place to practice speech/language skills and strategies. Take advantage of time spent in the car by playing some fun, language-based games.



Here are a few ideas:

- Categories: To play this game, one player chooses a category, such as "animals." Every player takes a turn naming an item in the category. If a player repeats a word or is unable to name a word in the category, he/she is out. Play continues until one player remains and wins the game. To make this task more complex, have the child add more descriptive words to the category (e.g., animals with tails, animals that live in the zoo) or name animals alphabetically (eg., aardvark, bear, cat, dog, etc.).
- **Rhyme Time:** To practice phonological awareness skills, children can practice creating rhymes for things they see from the car window or in the environment around them. For example, if a child chooses the word "tree," other players must name some rhyming words (e.g., knee, see, me). The player who gives the most rhymes is the winner! As an added bonus, players can create rhymes using nonsense words (e.g., slee, dree). Other players take turns identifying whether the rhyming word is a real word or a nonsense word.
- Guess It: Players take turns describing familiar items or objects (e.g., car, apple, baby). The first player chooses an object and gives three clues to describe it. All of the other players take turns guessing what the first player is describing (e.g., it is a fruit; it can be red or green; it grows on a tree). If no players guess correctly, the first player provides another clue about the object. The player who correctly identifies the mystery object earns a point and chooses the next word to describe.

Long rides in the car can be fun and educational! Playing games during long trips is a great way to expand and reinforce language skills.
