NEW ORLEANS, La. — Brittany Ross was getting ready to eat. She was thinking that her aunt's white beans smelled delicious. Then, the tornado hit without warning. The swirling tube of wind shook her trailer back and forth.

"The place started shaking, kind of twisting," she said.

The tornado lifted her trailer off the ground, Ross said. Then, it slammed it down, smashing it apart. Ross, her aunt and two others crawled out of the smashed home. They were not hurt, but suddenly they were homeless.

Tornadoes Blew Through Fast

The tornado that struck Ross' home was not the only one. Several other tornadoes also blew through southeastern Louisiana this week.

The tornadoes ripped apart homes. They flipped cars and trucks. They also knocked down power lines, making the lights go out in thousands of buildings.

About 40 people were hurt during the storms. Luckily, no one died.

"We Ran In The House"

Artie Chaney was caught in one of the tornados. She and her granddaughter had just driven up to their house when the storm hit.

Chaney "saw the clouds moving fast," she said. "I heard this sound." Before they knew it, the tornado was speeding toward them.

"We ran in the house," Chaney said. "The lights went out. We ran down the hallway to the middle bedroom and then we just heard glass shattering. We thought we weren't gonna make it. It seemed like it lasted a long time."

Chaney said the whole thing was very frightening. She feels very lucky that no one was hurt.

People Were Not Hurt Too Badly

Towns near Baton Rouge also got hit. Baton Rouge is the capital city of Louisiana. In Donaldsonville, three people were slightly hurt. Several homes and buildings were knocked down.

A number of houses were also smashed in nearby Killian. An elderly man and woman were hurt, said Killian's mayor, Craig McGehee. They had some broken bones.

The two were outside when the tornado hit. They were "blown completely across the street,"McGehee said. Big pieces of rocks were flying around them. Somehow, they were not badly hurt.

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"The good Lord was looking after them," McGehee said. They could		
have been killed.
