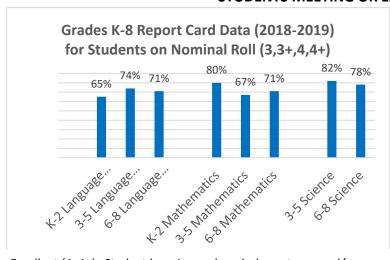

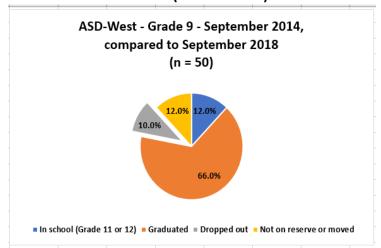

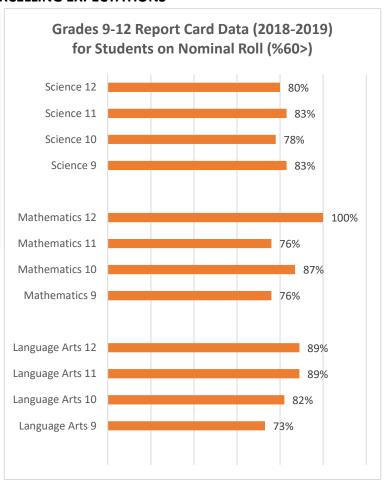


Excellent (4, 4+) Student learning and work show strong and/or exceptional achievement.
