Perth-Andover Middle School

- Hosted a presentation by Imedla Perley on medicine wheel teachings relating it to the wellness wheel covered in all health classes. As students walk on our yellow, white, black and red striped crosswalk, they can reflect what the colour symbolizes to our First Nations Culture.
- Students participated in wheelchair basketball in phys-ed classes over a two-week period presented by Para NB Sport and Recreation and the Village of Perth-Andover. Students learned new strategies for playing a familiar sport while gaining a greater sense of empathy for the challenges faced by those with physical disabilities.

Woodstock Senior High School

- Students and community partners received the NB Crime Prevention Award on November 9 for the program: *Ages of Sexual Consent vs assault*. This fits into the PDCP and Family Dynamics curricula.

Fredericton High School

- Kats' Kitchen – universal, inclusive food support system for students of Fredericton High. Core committee involves more than 50 volunteer students who run and operate the program under the guidance and leadership of the school's senior members. On average, we serve, 150 Grab & Go breakfasts and 125 lunches. We partner with the Fredericton Community Kitchen and our Culinary Tech class to meet the dietary needs of all students including those of our newcomers.
- FHS Production – Grease - Nov. 23-26 – an inclusive production involving more than 100 students both on stage and behind the scenes

New Maryland Elementary School

- K-2 students enjoy participation in running club during the fall and spring. Older students help manage. We were fortunate this year to have marathon runner, Ryan O'Shea, join the group.
- We've added some iPads to our Writer Maker Space. Students love to move, mix, invent and play as part of the writing process.

Kingsclear Consolidated School

- Chapters Indigo adopted KCS and granted \$5574.03 to the school. Students worked on creating bookmarks, posters, works of art (which was then displayed and auctioned off at Chapters), wrote stories about their favourite books and why reading is important to them.
- KCS entered a partnership with UNB (PhD student Norma St. Croix) to work with staff to develop next steps for student achievement in literacy based on student results obtained through standardized tests (DIBELS).

School Success Story Snapshots

Lincoln Elementary Community School

- The Young Entrepreneur Program is about students having fun and gaining real life career experience as they explore the world of business. They set and achieve goals and develop practical life skills by preparing a business plan, developing products and designing marketing material. This was a grant offered by the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development, which our Grade 4 teacher applied for and received.
- Roots of Empathy Program - 9 different themes that focus on the development of the baby, knowledge of the brain, connection between a parent and baby, and then the aspect of empathy where students learn about understanding the feelings of others.

Minto Elementary/Middle School

- MEMS has established a new student council creating an opportunity for student voice and engagement. It has had a direct impact on participants' self-worth and sense of belonging.
- Breakfast program enhanced by the licensing of our Home Ec. Room kitchens and our menu has expanded to entice the majority of our student population. We believe nourished bodies result in nourished minds.

Oromocto High School

- Culinary Technology has been reintroduced after a decade's long absence. Students recently provided a snack for the entire school to go along with the tree-lighting ceremony. Students are highly engaged and come with an energy to learn each day.
- In conjunction with the Oromocto Food Bank, we began a partnership last school year where students and our School Intervention Worker work each week to provide lunch, at no cost, to those students who would otherwise have none. The bagged lunch program from last year has expanded this year to include a hot soup offering made at the Food Bank and delivered to students at OHS. This initiative, started by our SIW, and supported financially by the school now serves more than 70 students each week.
