DID YOU KNOW....?

1. Every two minutes we snap more pictures than the whole of humanity did in the 1800s.

It's estimated only a few million pictures were taken in the 80 years before the first commercial camera was introduced. In 1999, the peak of the film-camera industry, Kodak reported that people took around 80 billion photos. Nowadays it is very hard to estimate how many photos are taken annually, but here are some statistics for 2015. According to [Benedict Evans](#), People share 730 billion photos per year on Facebook, 255 billion – on WhatsApp and around 22 billion – on Instagram. And don't even get us started on Snapchat, Apple's iMessage, WeChat and other small messaging and photo-sharing apps. We can only estimate that around 3 trillion of photos will be taken this year. Or more!

The **oldest known surviving photograph** is [*View from the Window at Le Gras*](#), taken by Nicéphore Niépce in 1826 or 1827. It took about eight hours to expose!
