

What an exciting time for the New Brunswick Teen Apprenticeship Program (NBTAP). During October and November, the NBTAP Program was pleased to participate in The Atlantic Association of Registrars and Admissions Officers (AARAO) Tour throughout the Province. This provided an opportunity for the Pre-Apprenticeship Coordinator to meet students, school champions, guidance counsellors and teachers. It was an interesting experience to interact with the students, while finding out about their experiences and interests within skilled trades.

Many students are participating within the *Experiential Learning* realm, while others are enjoying their co-op opportunities. It is important for those students to remember, that every little bit counts when it comes to experiences and credits towards skilled trades. As well, a student participating in co-op under a certified journeyperson, and that employer wishes to hire them for the summer, that is great news. The employer is to reach out to the Pre-Apprenticeship Coordinator at the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development (EECD) to register.

During February 2023, the job advertisements will be posted to the NBTAP pages on the Future NB website. Students can then start submitting their resume for any position they feel best suits their interests. Students can apply anywhere in the province if they can get to and from work effectively.

We are also happy to announce that we have already confirmed placements for students who have contacted employers directly. Your initiative has truly proven to be beneficial.

The **most recent and exciting news** is that NBTAP is now an accredited course towards high school graduation. Students can talk to their NBTAP School Champions to learn more about this.

As we move forward throughout the winter months, there will be presentations within the schools around the Province, as well as lunch and learn opportunities for students, teachers, and employers. This will help to expand the knowledge of NBTAP and its importance to both skilled trade employers and students.

Qualities of an Effective Mentor

Throughout our lifetime, we will encounter people who are positive and motivating. They leave a lasting impact upon our lives. Great mentors have extensive job experience(s). They serve as a role model and advise in Professional Development opportunities. If you find a person that you can connect with, admire, and who can professionally advise you, that will have a long-lasting impact upon your career development.

Let's look at some qualities that this individual may possess:

Generous with their Time – Mentoring can take some substantial time. They know that they must devote time to mentoring. Employers and students need to work together to ensure that there is adequate time to communicate effectively.

Active Listening Skills – Mentors can share knowledge and guidance in-person or by email. Professional mentors also make a point of listening carefully. They devote equal energy to listening and speaking, and their active-listening skills ensure they hear what is said and understand what it meant. Find someone who listens and offers helpful feedback to ensure you get the support you need.

Willingness to Connect/Network – The individual understands the importance of networking to create relationships is essential to success. Look for someone who is eager to connect you with relevant experts to help you gain knowledge of the skilled trade. As one pursues an area of expertise, this mentor may even recommend you to others as an experienced skilled trade employee.

Investment in Education and Growth - Many mentors believe that learning is a life-long endeavor. They believe that professional success extends beyond what they have accomplished. *They invest in educating others*. Mentors know the importance of teaching others to become effective professionals who can help shape the industry and ensure it continues to flourish. Developing this mentoring relationship can also your professional growth.

Goal Driven – Mentors prioritize goals and develop action plans to improve themselves.

Supporting Your Student(s):

Starting a new summer job can be both exciting and nervous for your child. Here are some ways that can you support them throughout the NBTAP Program:

- Encouragement for success during their summer employment;
- Assist with resume and cover letter development;
- Provide transportation to and from the work site;
- Ensuring proper dress and safety equipment for the job site are prepared;
- Encouraging proper personal hygiene habits and proper rest;
- Help prepare meals/snacks, beverages and their personal protective clothing;
- Encourage the student to talk about their work experiences what they have learned; and
- Talk about what employers can expect when working on a work site (no cell phone use, communication, paying attention, etc.).

EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

The *Experiential Learning (EL)* opportunities have been growing within all levels of our school systems. Here are some of the wonderful initiatives that have been happening:

Menstrual Hygiene Boxes: Essential Skills Achievement
Pathway (ESAP) Students at Riverview High School
participated in Experiential Learning by building wooden boxes
to store Menstrual Hygiene Products in student washrooms. The
students built and stained 28 boxes for every High School and
Middle School within the Anglophone East School District.

Fire Burn & Try-a-Trade: During Fire Prevention Week in October, nearly 400 students across Anglophone East School District participated in a large scale *Try-a-Trade* and *Fire Burn* with local partners. Students witnessed a live demonstration of a Fire Burn, showcasing the importance of sprinklers and fire safety, while hearing about the role of a Sprinkler Fitter. The trade exhibitors featured experts from the industry, associations, and unions. All booths from the industry showcased a "hands-on" approach to learning, meaning that the participants got to try a part of the trade featured at the booth.
