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

After a morning presentation, students and staff participated in a Water Walk to recognize the sacredness of water and the importance of protecting it from drought, waste and pollution.

An Indigenous Showcase in the NMS cafeteria and newly opened lounge area, welcomed staff and students to taste fry bread, do some colouring, and explore some of the handiwork of NMS First Nations students.

The student artwork included beaded dream catchers, bracelets, necklaces, earrings and rings, as well as paintings. A very popular attraction was that visitors to the Showcase were able to watch First Nations students create their jewelry on-site. Kaden Booker, a student of Gray's, says he finds the beading process very relaxing and rewarding. Classmates Chantal Paul-Reid and Ava Paul agree that the beading takes time and patience but that the end results are work to be proud of.

Video presentations to further explain the history of First Nations people, as well as the importance and significance of this day, were also shared with staff and students.


Students participated in a water colour painting activity led by Julia Reid, creating pictures of trees and their roots by using straws and paint.

Caroline Theriault has been a librarian since 2006 and has been an employee at the Nashwaaksis Public Library at NMS for the past 15 years. Her passion for books and the library started young. When she was in grade 4, she had a special connection with her school librarian, who encouraged her love of reading. Of her former school librarian, Theriault says she was the best person ever and would "... let me read books for older kids cause she said 'I know you can handle this stuff'."

In high school, Theriault learned how to work in a school library, checking books out for students, putting books away, and attending Library Club. Her love of books and libraries only grew from that point on.

Theriault says the Nashwaaksis Public Library not only loans out books for free but they also have TV shows, movies, music and musical instruments. Visitors can check out most items for three weeks and some can be extended.

In order to draw people's attention toward the library, Theriault makes it her mission to create eye-catching window displays that match the season or calendar events throughout the year. When asked why she does this, Theriault simply says "Well, we just like to make things cheerful and fun... and the decorations make it pop!"

TEACHER FEATURE ON... JON COPELAND

Reporters Brett Gee and Sophia Sharp, interviewed Jon Copeland, a grade 8 teacher at Nashwaaksis Middle School. Here is their Q & A.

Q: What grade and subject do you teach and how long have you been teaching?

I teach a grade 7-8 split. I teach four Language Arts classes and one Science class. This is my 8th year teaching.

Q: What is the best thing about your job?

The best thing about my job is being able to see the growth in students from the first day they walk in, in September, until the end of June.

Q: How long does it take to make a lesson plan?

It depends if it's new or if it's something I've done before. It's normally one to two hours.

Q: What is your best memory of teaching?

It was my first year teaching and I had a non verbal student. He wrote what he wanted to say, but he never wrote anything for me. On the last day of school he finally wrote something for me; he wrote "bye."



Q: Was teaching your first job choice and do you feel that students respect you?

It was between journalism and teaching . I considered both, but decided to become a teacher when I was 25. Yes, I feel students respect me.
