



Atlantic Indigenous Mentorship Network 2019 Promise Scholarships for Indigenous High School students entering health-related PSE programs

The Atlantic-IMN is launching a new **Promise Scholarship program** for **Indigenous high school students** who will be graduating high school in 2020 and who are applying to attend a health-related program at a post-secondary institution for the next school year (Fall or Winter 2020).

To be eligible to apply, a student is required to:

- Identify as First Nations, Métis, or Inuit; and
- Must be from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, or Newfoundland & Labrador but do not need to be currently living in one of these provinces; and
- Be entering Grade 12 in the Fall of 2019; and
- Have a minimum of 75% average in their grade 11 high school courses; and
- Be planning to apply to at least one health-related program at a university, college or other PSE institution that begins next school year (Fall 2020) or be able to describe how your educational path will provide you the opportunity get into or work in a health field

The available funding is \$1,500 per Promise Scholarship:

- A portion of funds (\$500) will be awarded to successful applicants when they officially accept an offer of admission to a health-related program for the next school year
- The remaining funds (\$1000) will be awarded when the student officially begins their PSE program (in Fall or Winter 2020). *Important note:* if you defer your admission to the following year (2021) you will not be eligible to receive this scholarship.

Applications will be evaluated based on:

- Presentation and writing quality of application (resume and application letter)
- Academic/extracurricular achievements and community involvement
- Having future goals for a health-related career that can help improve the health and wellbeing of Indigenous peoples
