- Build a house for the 3 little pigs that you think the wolf won't be able to blow down! Use materials that you find outside or around your house. Once your house is built, use a blow dryer to test it to see if it stays standing or not. The blow dryer is the wolf!

- Design and build another way for the goats to get across the river since the bridge is completely closed off and guarded by the troll! (Something that will fly, float, bounce etc...). Draw and write about what you built!
- Write a note trying to persuade the troll to become friends with the goats and share the bridge.


## Extension Activities

- Use triangles, circles, squares and rectangles to create your own fairy tale castle. Then count and record your shapes. Complete the following sentence about your castle: "To make my fairy tale castle I used $\qquad$ circles,
