For everything you write: please remember to use periods/punctuation, capital letters where they are needed and check your spelling of words you're supposed to know. I put a picture of the Writing Traits that are up on my bulletin board for Grades 6 and 7. Grade 8's can use the Grade 7 ones. They're pretty much the same for all Middle School students. Please make sure you are using the Writing Traits list and check your work over to make sure you're doing the best you can do.

READING – You should be reading at least 30 minutes each day. This could be any of the following: books, magazines, newspapers (yes, they still make paper ones but you could read online news too), online blogs, articles, e-books (borrow some from the public library). You could read to younger siblings too. Once a week, I would like you to write a response to something you have read. You could tell something about the characters, setting, what is happening in the story, any interesting words you find, your favorite/least favorite part or predict what will happen in the next part of the book. If you are reading non-fiction (informational) material, tell 4 things you learned that you didn't know before or something you already know that wasn't in the article.



(For a challenge, you can time yourself and see how many you can get right in a certain amount of time and set a goal to see your improvement!)

Battleship

How to play: Plot all of your ships by drawing an outline of each ship on the grid according to its size. (ex. Battleship is 4 blocks). Ships may not overlap. Don't let your enemy see your ships!

Take turns firing upon your enemy by calling out ordered pairs (ex. (2,6)) Mark your shots as "hit" (X) or "miss" (dot) on your Enemy Ships Cartesian plane according to your enemy's reply. Any point touching your ship is a hit.



Patrol Boat 2 blocks





THE KLONDIKE GOLD RUSH

After word got out of the discovery of gold at Bonanza Creek in the Klondike, about a hundred thousand people headed to the Yukon. The economy worldwide was not doing well (this is known as a "recession") and the lure of easy wealth was hard to resist. Four out of five of the people, mostly men, who arrived in Canada's northwest were American. Many left the western coastal cities of North America and began a long and difficult journey in their quest for gold. Others came by railway from the eastern part of the continent and some made the journey from Europe.

Once the prospectors travelled past Victoria and Vancouver, there were few settlements of any size along the Pacific coast. From those small coastal towns they journeyed inland to reach the Klondike. The land was barren and travel was not easy and once summer was over, there was the added challenge of harsh weather. Yukon is mountainous and there was the difficulty of climbing through mountain passes carrying large knapsacks or pulling sleds piled with supplies. The men had to bring enough provisions to feed and shelter themselves. If they did not bring these items they were not allowed into the Klondike prospecting area.

Many of the men turned back and went home when they reached Bonanza Creek and realized the best areas had already been claimed by others. Those who managed to get there early often became rich – instant millionaires, if they were lucky enough to find large nuggets of gold.

With the gold rush came the growth of Dawson City. There were many people who became wealthy by establishing businesses to sell items to the prospectors. There were also drinking and gambling establishments but these were soon "cleaned up" by a recently formed police force. At that time it was known as the North West Mounted

Police, and the force eventually became part of the RCMP (the Royal Canadian Mounted Police). The American area of prospecting in Alaska was plagued with crime and violence but Dawson City was usually quiet and well ordered.

The Klondike Gold Rush lasted only a short time but created a lot of excitement in North America and beyond. Books and poems were written, and newspapers "back home" covered it heavily. The most lasting result was the establishment of Yukon territory in 1899.
