

Development of Speech Sounds

There is a developmental pattern for the development of speech sounds that *most* children follow.

Sounds that typically develop first include:

Sounds that develop next include:

Later developing sounds include:

l, r, s, z, v, th, sh, ch, j, consonant blends (e.g. spoon, blue, truck)

When Should I Be Concerned?

How clear should a child's speech be?

In addition to when your child uses sounds, we also have to consider how easy they are to understand. Someone who does <u>not</u> know your child should be able to understand:

- about 50% of what a 2 year old says
- about 75% of what a 3 year old says
- about 90% of what a 4 year old says
- almost 100% of what a 5 year old says

Watch for errors that may be of more concern such as:

- Dropping sounds (e.g. "un" for "sun", especially after age three)
- Using one or two sounds everywhere
- Not using a sound correctly by the age at which it is expected (chart on back)
