Youth Employment Fund

The Youth Employment Fund provides an entry point to long term employment for unemployed individuals between 18-29 years of age who require a work experience opportunity. By placing an individual with an employer, the individual will gain work experience and develop skills through basic workplace training, mentoring and coaching. Graduating high school students, at least 18 years of age, who do not plan to attend postsecondary education and plan to enter the labour force immediately after high school may apply for this program after May 1. Please submit your information and a staff member from your local Post-Secondary Education, Training and Labour office will contact you to assist with the application process and determine your eligibility. Growth Mindset - Summer Thoughts

We have had many suggestions and ideas in our newsletter throughout the year to encourage you and your families to adopt a growth mindset. Here are our final thoughts on growth mindset as you go into the summer months.

Research suggests that parents should think twice about praising our children for being "smart" or "talented", because this may foster a *fixed mindset*. Instead, if we encourage our children's efforts and acknowledge their persistence and hard work, then we will support their development of a *growth mindset*. Children with a growth mindset believe that with effort and persistence they can learn and achieve in school and in life. A growth mindset will better equip them to persevere and pick themselves up when things don't go their way. Parents should also examine their own belief system. Do you have a growth mindset? Do you believe that with effort, persistence and motivation your children can achieve their goals?

Dr. Carol Dweck, an educational researcher states, "Parents should not shield their children from challenges, mistakes and struggles. Instead, parents should teach children to love challenges. They can say things like "This is hard. What fun!" or "This is too easy. It's no fun." They should teach their children to embrace mistakes, "Oooh, here's an interesting mistake. What should we do next?" And they should teach them to love effort: "That was a fantastic struggle. You really stuck to it and made great progress" or "This will take a lot of effort -boy, will it be fun."

Some parents need to work on having a growth mindset. It takes time and practice, but it is well worth it when you see the difference that it makes in your children!
