




This month's book had real potential to be exceptional. *Spin the Dawn* by Elizabeth Lim had a solid premise and delivered really well up until the second part. It's the story of Maia Tamarin who must disguise herself as a boy and enter into a sewing competition to save her father's legacy and prove that she is the greatest tailor in the land. She ends up being introduced to magic and takes off on adventures she could have never anticipated. There is a second book *Unravel the Dusk* if you enjoy this one and want to continue Maia's journey.

This book is divided into parts, and I feel the first part delivered very well. It builds backstory easily and sets up the premise. The author's writing is easy to follow and a pleasure to read. The first section is primarily focused on the sewing competition and is a lot of fun. It reads like a competitive TV show set in the past. If the whole book could've been written in that style, I have a feeling I would have enjoyed it a lot more. The second section is where it went downhill for me.

As you progress into the second section, and truly the rest of the book, it seems to lose its charm. The writing stays consistent and pleasant to read, smoothly flowing off the page, but the story starts to fall flat. The second section is where Maia starts her journey, and where I expected to see more action. Unfortunately, while action is included, it tends to be bland. The excitement is over in about a page and it doesn't leave you on the edge of your seat just waiting to see what happens next. I found myself being distracted and setting the book down a lot.

This review has been very critical, but that is not to say there are no redeeming factors. Lim has managed to create a thoughtful world filled with an array of diverse characters. Her writing is beautiful and carries the book. No matter how bored I got of the story line, I kept going back to enjoy the style of writing.

The contrast of loving the style and the beginning of the book, to hating the middle/end and storyline lands this book right in the middle. I give it 3/5 stars.

Elizabeth Lim's debut novel *Spin the Dawn* is a super-fun read filled with personable, broken characters and an interesting twist on a classic Macguffin quest. The novel starts in Maia's hometown where we learn about her living conditions, and then quickly moves to the Imperial Palace where the plot starts to unfold. The first part of the novel is by far the best part of the book. This is where we meet the rest of the characters and where Maia participates in the competition to become the Imperial tailor.

The characters in *Spin the Dawn* are some of my all-time favourite fictional characters. Maia is a good blank canvas protagonist while still having lots of her own memorable traits, Lady Sarnai is a complicated women put into an even more complicated position, and the other tailors Maia competes against have an amazing dynamic and different traits. While these characters are well developed and fleshed out, unfortunately the others pale in comparison. Eden, the love interest and secondary protagonist seemed extremely boring to me. He is this brooding, mysterious sorcerer with a dark past, and I have grown tired of the mysterious love interest cliché.

When a novel has good characters, usually the plot complements them well. The best parts of *Spin the Dawn* were when Maia was driving the plot herself, which is what made the more formulaic Macguffin quest stand out to me. One of my favourite parts is when Maia and Eden are stuck in the desert with some wanderers and Maia reflects on where she would be if she had stayed home and uses that knowledge of a life she could have had to progress through the plot. To me, those moments felt fresh and exciting, which is why I was more disappointed when the plot got in the way of the characters being themselves.

I think if the third act of the novel's conflict wasn't external and had been more internal, I would have overall liked the novel more; however, these low points of the novel are still enjoyable--just more cliché than I would have liked. *Spin the Dawn* was one of my favourite reads from last year and I still stand by that statement. It's unique and filled with heart. I give it three and a half stars out of five and recommend it to anyone who likes reading fantasy.
