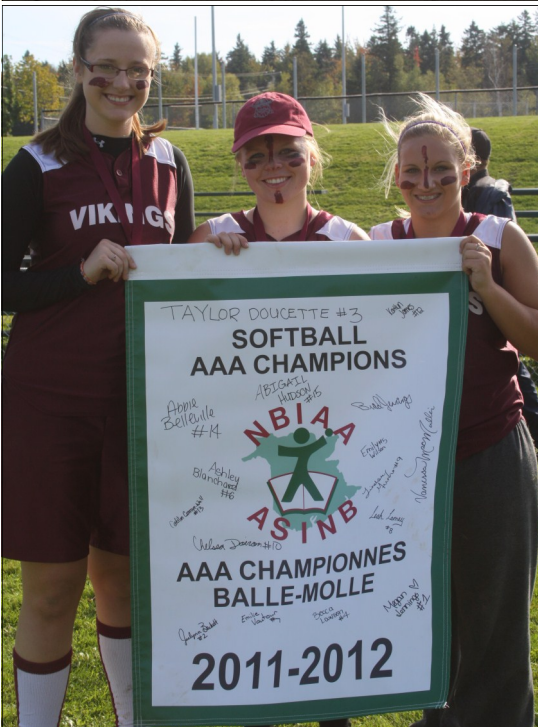

It takes a long time and a lot of dedication to put on a full length ballet, so the girls have been hard at work for weeks.

"All the dancers have started putting in extra rehearsals to get ready," said Mallory. "We've all been working really hard to make it better than last year. And this year's performance is really special to Mrs. Scott."


This year's *Nutcracker* is also a fundraiser.

"My niece, Maria, was born with a rare genetic disorder called CDG (Congenital Disorder of Glycosylation). My brother, Duncan, who works as a doctor here in Saint John (infectious disease specialist), started a foundation (TheFoG) to support research on CDG," explained Mrs. Scott, Artistic Director for Port City Dance Academy. "Our goals for *The Nutcracker* are especially personal and ambitious this year."

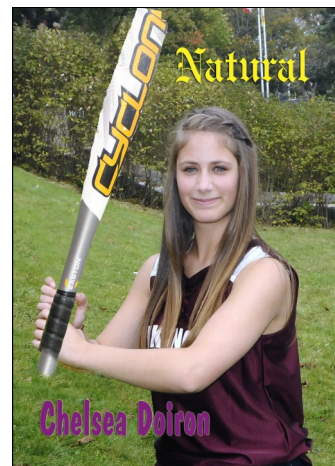
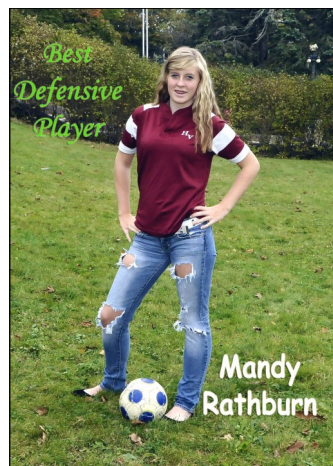
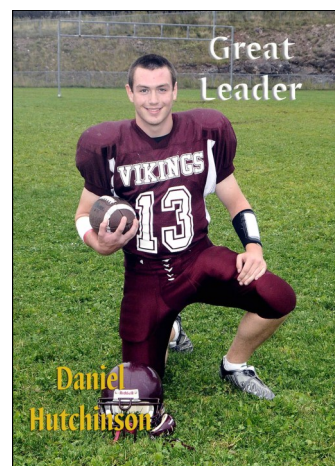
