

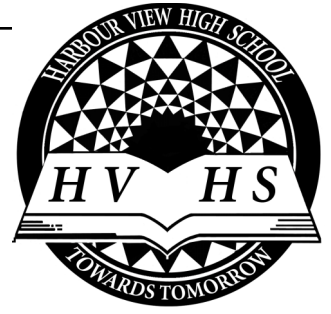

Students attend WE Day

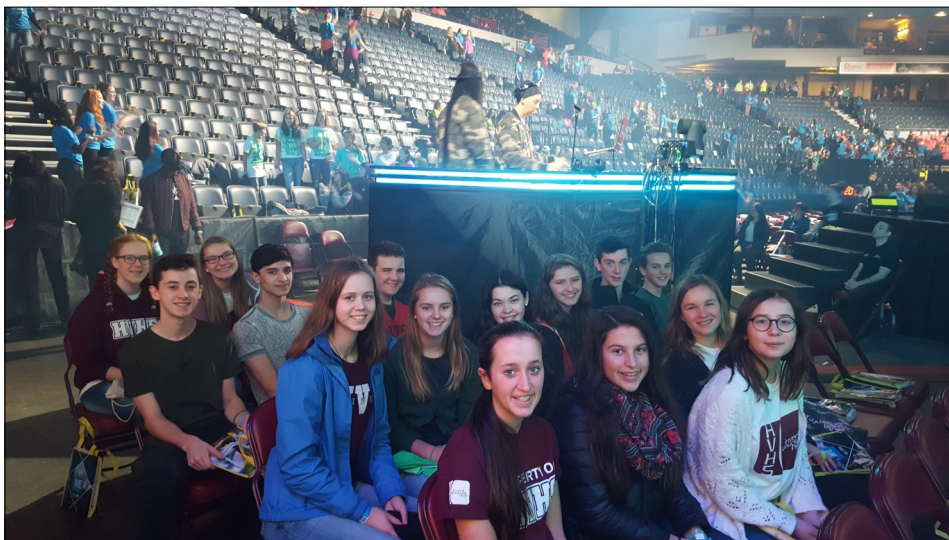

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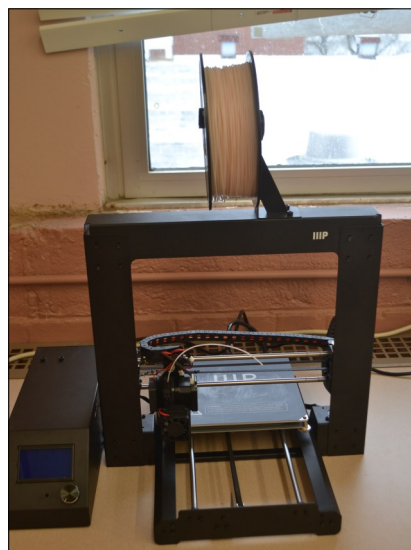

Advancing technology at Harbour View

It started with a very determined teacher. Mrs. Hodgkin "wanted to bring the Computer Aid and Design class into the twenty-first century, so I asked Mr. Butler if we could get a 3D printer."

Mr. Butler, our new principal, thought about Brilliant Labs. As their website (www.brilliantlabs.com) states "Brilliant Labs is a not-for-profit, technology- and project-based, learning platform based in Atlantic Canada. We support the integration of today's innovation and technologies, combined with a keen entrepreneurial spirit within classrooms and educational curricula through active, experiential, hands-on learning."



"We are thrilled to have been able to partner with Brilliant Labs this year to provide new opportunities for our students. We are excited about what that partnership will offer as we enhance our technology programs at Harbour View," said Mr. Butler.

Brilliant Labs provided the new 3D printer that is set up in room 302. Mrs. Hodgkin is quite pleased with the printer even though she thinks it's going to take a little bit of tinkering in order to get use to it properly. Meanwhile she had her students on a site called Tinkercad where they are designing 3D objects to print on the new equipment.

I was actually the first student to design and print an object with the 3D printer. What I made was a snowflake with my name on it. It was fun to design and interesting to see the process that had to happen in order to print it. The design I made had to be sliced using a program called Cura. This program made my design into a whole lot of layers that is what the 3D printer needed to do in order to make the snowflake. My friends like to joke around about it because they say the only way to get the proper spelling of my name is to design it myself. This technology is very cool, and the possibilities, although confined to a certain amount of space, are limitless; whatever you can imagine and design could be printed off.

The specific type of printer that Brilliant Labs donated is called Prusa I3. It will be a unique addition to the CAD class. Although it's a bit of a work in progress it most certainly helped Mrs. Hodgkin's plan to bring the class into the 21st century.

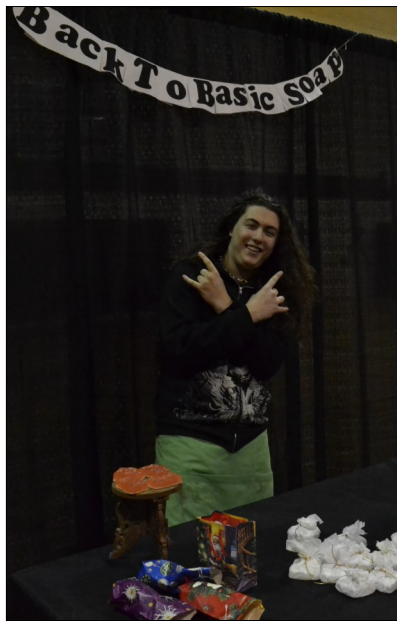

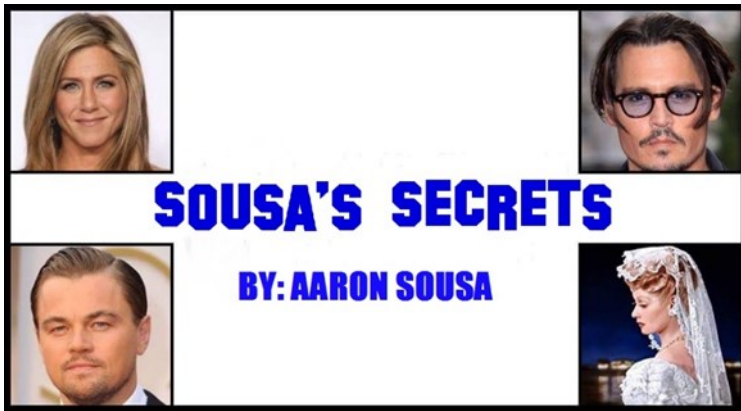

This month I would like to talk about some actors and actresses that have passed on during these past few months. They will always be remembered.

Alan Thicke: As much as I hate to report on this, I have to. Well-known '80s dad Alan Thicke passed away on December 13th, 2016. This journalist has learned that Thicke passed away after having a heart attack while playing hockey with his 19 year old son, Carter, at a rink in Burbank,

California. Television audiences will best remember the Canadian actor for his role as Jason Seaver in the '80s sitcom, *Growing Pains*. During his nearly 50 years in the business, he has hosted game shows, talk shows and even written the theme songs to a few very successful television shows like *Wheel of Fortune* as well as *Growing Pains*. Former star of *Growing Pains* and Christian actor, Kirk Cameron, took to Instagram to express his condolences to his TV dad. "I spent Monday through Friday for seven important years with Alan Thicke as my 'TV dad,'" said Cameron, "I'm shocked and truly heartbroken today at the news of his death. Alan was a generous, kind and loving man. I am so blessed to have grown up with him." Alan Thicke is survived by his sons Robin, Carter and Brennan and his wife Tanya. He was 69.

Florence Henderson: This celebrity death upset me greatly, so I'll try not to get tears on the keyboard while I type. While Alan Thicke was known for playing a TV dad, this wonderful actress is best known for playing a TV mom in the 1970s. Florence Henderson, who played the iconic role of Carol Brady on the 70's family sitcom, *The Brady Bunch*, passed away on November, 24th, 2016. According to Henderson's rep, she died of heart failure at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center in Los Angeles. She was with her family at the time. During her 60 year career, she has appeared on Broadway, multiple movie roles and cameos, along with television shows. But her most well known as loving mom, Carol Ann Brady. Her death comes as a shock to the world as her death was sudden. A few days before she passed, she attended a taping of the ABC television show, *Dancing with the Stars* to support her former TV daughter Maureen McCormick, who is a contestant on the show. Sources there said that Henderson was in perfect health as she had not been ill prior to her admission to Cedars-Sinai. She was 82.

Janet Wright: To finish off this month's solemn column, this is another well-known Canadian that has since passed away. Janet Wright, best known for playing Emma Leroy on the CTV sitcom *Corner Gas*, passed away due to unknown causes on November 14th, 2016. Born in England on March, 8th, 1945, she and her family moved to Canada and settled down in Saskatoon at a very young age. Ever since the 1970s, she has had connections with the Vancouver Art's Club Theatre and even directed productions for major theatre companies across Canada including productions at the Stratford Festival in Ontario. In 1992, Wright won the Genie Award for best actress for a role in the Canadian film *Bordertown Cafe* and she also won Best Supporting Actress in a Dramatic Program or Miniseries in 2003 for the show *Betrayed*. She has also starred alongside George Clooney and Mark Wahlberg in 2000 for the film, *The Perfect Storm*. In 2014, she reprised her character of Emma Leroy in *Corner Gas: The Movie*. Her health was dwindling in the film according to co-star and creator of *Corner Gas*, Brent Butt. We had her on a scooter, you see it in the movie, her character, we wrote it in that she's riding a scooter," he said. "But she was there every day and nailed her lines and did an amazing job, despite everything." She was 71.



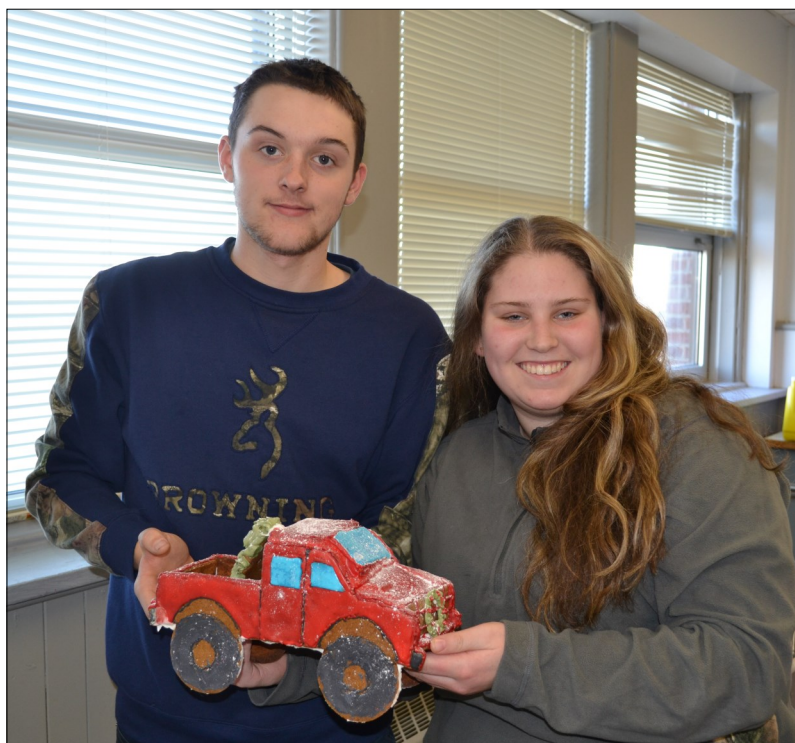
