6 Period Day

Classroom Assessment Practice

All students at St. Malachy's are assessed on an ongoing basis using current best practices. *Assessment for Learning* (Formative assessment) is designed as feedback towards improvement and is recorded on student work using the codes;

- *Red (R) (*working below learning goals),
- Yellow (Y) (approaching learning goals),
- **Green (G)** (meeting learning goals).

Assessment of Learning (Summative assessment) is done at the completion of a unit and is gathered from a variety of sources. In keeping with best assessment practices, Triangulation of Assessment involves gathering the evidence of learning from three sources;

- *Products* (tests, essays, projects, demonstrations and presentations),
- **Observations** (daily interactions with the teacher where the student demonstrates their knowledge and depth of understanding),
- *Conversations* (regularly scheduled written or oral dialogue between teachers and students which enables students to demonstrate mastery of content).

By gathering evidence of learning in this way, we are ensuring that our assessment is a valid reflection of a student's knowledge and ability.

Student Evaluation - Exam, Marks, Report Cards

All students at St. Malachy's complete a final assessment for each course taken. Exams for first semester courses will be held in January, while exams for second semester courses will be held in June. Report cards will be issued twice each semester as follows:

First Semester

November: Progress report January: Final course mark (Semestered courses only)

Second Semester

April: Progress report June: Final course mark

Assessment Policy

All Summative Assessments Products; including major tests /assignments/projects, performance tasks and exams must be completed.

PRODUCTS—Assignments, Projects, Presentations

There will be *Firm Deadlines* for summative assessment products. If a student is unable to meet the deadline they must make arrangements with their teachers in order to complete the missed work. Should the student fail to follow the agreed upon plan they will be assigned a grade based on the evidence shown to date. Missed assessments worth a large portion of an assessment package will result in a referral to the Vice Principal and an incomplete (INC) may be given for the course. *Parents* can remain informed about student progress and missed deadlines by activating their Parent Portal access to PowerSchool. Please contact the school at 658-5361 to learn more. Parents are encouraged to keep their contact information up to date including e-mail addresses so that teachers can make contact when they are concerned about the academic progress of your child.

PRODUCTS—Tests, Performance Tasks, Final Exams

Students will be given reasonable notice of testing dates and test content. All students are expected to write the test on the assigned day unless they have a written excuse from a parent. Should a student miss a scheduled test, the following steps will be taken in order that the marked test can be given back to all students in a timely fashion; (i) The test will be written the following day either in class (where appropriate) or during the lunch hour. (ii) Where a student misses the allotted make up time with their classroom teacher, they will be expected to make alternative arrangements with their teacher in order to complete the assessment (i.e. oral testing, alternative assignments), (iii) Any student who misses the opportunity to complete the assessment will meet with an administrator and disciplinary action will be taken.

OBSERVATIONS & CONVERSATIONS

All Summative Assessments Observations and/or Conversations will be completed during daily lessons and as such requires the attendance of all students. Daily attendance ensures that students are given ample opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge and to develop communication skills. Inconsistent attendance may lead to lower grades in this area due to lack of evidence.

Academic Dishonesty

Plagiarism is defined as knowingly using the words and/or ideas of another as though the words and/or ideas were their own. If a student plagiarizes, they will meet with the teacher and/or the administration. The teacher will, in the first case, give the student the benefit of the doubt and allow the student to resubmit the work with the necessary references added. If the same student plagiarizes a second time, further disciplinary action will take place.

Students suspected or caught *cheating* on examinations and assessments will be presented to the school's administration team through the SPR of the related course of study. *Skipping a test* without a valid excuse can also be seen as gaining an unfair advantage and will be referred to the administration. From there a course of action will be determined.

Educational Support Services— Our Resource department helps students with specific learning needs to ensure they reach their academic potential. Our Guidance Department helps students with support towards post secondary planning, career exploration, social and emotional growth.

Graduation Requirements: Grades 11 & 12

In the 20-credit system, students must:

- meet the requirements of the prescribed common curriculum of the 9/10 program as outlined in the grades 9/10 Companion Document.
- obtain a literacy credential by achieving a successful rating on the Grade 9 English Language Proficiency Assessment or Reassessment.
- attain 17 of 20 credits (including compulsory credits) as outlined in the High School Program.
- accumulate a minimum of 5 credits at the grade 12 level.

There are 7 compulsory credits.

- 5 credits are obtained as follows:
 - English grade 11 (2 credits);
 - English grade 12 (1 credit);
 - Foundations 110 OR Financial and Workplace Math 110 (1 credit);
 - Modern History grade 11 (1 credit)
- 1 **credit** *must be in Science. Students can choose from*;
 - Physics, Biology, Chemistry, Environmental Science, Robotics and Physical Geography.
- 1 credit must be from the Fine Arts/Life Role Development Cluster. Students can choose from:

Visual Arts 110, Ind. Family Dynamics 120, Music 111/112, Co-op Ed 120, Outdoor Pursuits 110, Theatre Arts 120, Leadership 120, Graphic Arts and Design 110, Entrepreneurship 110, Reading Tutor 12, Wellness Phys. Ed 110

• 10 additional credits are chosen from the electives shown in our online course calendar

Graduation requirements for a student identified as being exceptional (as defined by the Education Act) may vary as documented in their Personal Learning Plan (PLP). Modification (MOD) and/or Individualization (IEP) must be indicated on the transcript. No such indication will appear on the diploma.

AP Capstone Diploma Program

St. Malachy's Memorial High School was one of only ten Canadian high schools, and the only school in Atlantic Canada, who piloted the AP Capstone Diploma. We are the only school to have graduates of the program.

What is AP Capstone?

- AP Capstone is an innovative diploma program that provides students with an opportunity to engage in rigorous scholarly practice of the core academic skills necessary for successful university completion.
- AP Capstone is built on the foundation of two courses AP Seminar and AP Research- and is designed to complement and enhance the in-depth, discipline-specific study provided through AP courses.
- AP Capstone cultivates curious, independent, and collaborative scholars and prepares them to make logical, evidence-based decisions.

The Advantages of AP Capstone include:

- Fosters the critical and creative thinking, argumentation, and research skills that are at the core of university readiness and essential for lifelong learning.
- Provides a setting to build on the knowledge and rigorous course work of AP in an interdisciplinary format.
- Offers students a unique opportunity to distinguish themselves to colleges and universities.

Option 1: AP Capstone Diploma

4 AP Subject Courses* (Grade 11 & 12) AP Seminar* (Grade 11) AP Research* (Grade 12)

AP Seminar - Course Description

Students will examine materials like news stories, research studies, and literary works to craft arguments to support a point of view and communicate them effectively through the use of various media. Students will consider an issue from multiple perspectives, evaluate the strength of an argument, and make logical, fact-based decisions. Students will be assessed through a combination of individual and team projects and presentations as well as through a written exam.

Option 2: AP Capstone Certificate

AP Seminar* (Grade 11) AP Research* (Grade 12)

AP Research - Course Description

Students will work with a mentor in order to explore an academic topic, problem, or issue that interests them and design, plan, and conduct a year-long research-based investigation to address it. The course culminates in an academic thesis paper of approximately 5,000 words and a presentation, performance, or exhibition with an oral defense; where you answer 3-4 questions from a panel of trained evaluators.

Students must attain an AP grade of 3 or higher to be eligible for the diploma/certificate.

FIT is a Canada wide program for high school students. It was designed to prepare students for a world that runs on computers. It provides high school graduates with technology and business/entrepreneurial skills and with essential workplace skills and experience.

When you complete the FIT Program you will earn a nationally recognized certificate(s) issued by ICTC. Depending on which courses you complete, you can obtain one of four levels of certification:

FIT Basic

Complete all competencies contained in the three required courses.

FIT with Experience

Complete required courses plus Co-op program, paid work or volunteer experience (min. 200 hours) in a related area.

FIT with Certification

Complete required courses and obtain certification in one of IT Essentials or Comp-TIA A+ or Microsoft Office Specialist (MOS)

FIT Plus

Complete all requirements for FIT with Experience and Certification plus complete an additional industry standard including CCNA or Java or CompTIA Network + or MOS.

What Will FIT Do For Do?

The FIT program is valuable in whatever career path you choose. Computers are used in every industry and profession. The work skills and experience you get through the FIT program are in every career. In fact, information technology employers say that work skills and experience are twice as important as technical skills. In addition to work skills and experience, by the end of the IT program, you will have the option to write industry standard certification exams such as A+, CCNA, JAVA or Microsoft Office Specialist.

General Guidelines for Students at STM

Student ATTENDANCE Expectations

- 1. All students *must attend* all classes in which they are registered including Homeroom Advisory. Being in school every day is extremely important both academically and socially.
- 2. Students absent during the day cannot engage in school events that night.
- 3. Students who are absent from class are expected to:
 - Submit an excuse to their teacher so their attendance record can be updated;
 - Students are not to leave the building during school hours without going to the office and signing out. Students are expected to sign in at the main office if they arrive after classes have begun. Students are expected to provide written excuses when signing out.

School Attendance Policy

- After three to five classes missed (excused and unexcused) in any one period the homeroom advisor will contact the home;
- After six to ten classes missed (excused and unexcused) a referral is made to our Education Support Services Team (ESS Team) by the homeroom teacher and a letter will be sent to the home. There will be one on one contact with the home by a member of the ESS Team.
- After 11 plus classes missed (excused and unexcused) administration involvement is activated.
- At 15 absences (excused and unexcused) the student and parent will be invited to attend a meeting to discuss the continued absences. The student will be placed on an attendance contract with the understanding that absences exceeding 20 days in a subject, will result in the student meeting with administration to determine an appropriate resolution. Students missing more than 20 Homeroom Advisory periods will not be eligible for High Honours/Honours Awards.

Attendance Notification

Attendance is monitored on a class by class basis, through regular contact with home by our teachers and through our automated *SchoolConnects* calling system. In order to effectively communicate with you, please make certain that we have a current working telephone number that can receive these incoming messages.

You can verify your child's attendance through the use of the PowerSchool Public Portal. If you have yet to register for this site, please contact the school office at 658-5361 for access details. At any time, if you have a question about an absence, please do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher.





General Guidelines for Students at St. Malachy's (Continued)

BEHAVIOURAL Expectations

- 1. **Student behaviour** at all times is to reflect the philosophy and traditions of the school. Inappropriate behaviour or language, lack of respect for others, bullying or harassment all contravene the positive learning environment and will not be tolerated.
- 2. Use of *illegal substances* on or off school property during the school day or during school functions will be dealt with by the administration and may be referred to the police.
- 3. *Dress Code.* We are trying to develop workplace ready students and as such use general workplace guidelines to define our dress code. All students are expected to wear clothing appropriate to the learning environment. Tank tops and clothing with profanity, suggestive words, or references to unacceptable behaviours are deemed inappropriate. Shorts or skirts shorter than mid-thigh, bottoms that expose undergarments, transparent tops, excessively tight clothing, and clothing revealing midriffs are unacceptable.
- 4. Students are not permitted to use *electronic devices* during instructional hours, unless it is under the direction of the teacher.
- 5. Conduct of students on *school buses* or city transit buses must be of a high standard or students could face confiscation of their pass, loss of their bus privilege or possible suspension. Traveling on a yellow bus or a city transit bus is a privilege, not a right.
- 6. The *cafeteria* will be open during the school day for students. If students use the cafeteria during the breaks they are expected to report to class on time.
- 7. *Vending machines* are located near the gymnasium. These are to be used during student breaks only not during class time no food or drink is permitted in the classroom, gymnasium or student lounge, with the exception of water.
- **8. Smoking or vaping** is not permitted within 30 metres of the school. This means smoking is not allowed in the washrooms, in the school, on steps of the school, in the parking lots, near the buildings around the school, or on the sidewalks surrounding the school. This policy is continuously in effect.
- 9. Students involved in disciplinary action by the school are ineligible to participate in extra-curricular events during the disciplinary period. Students may require removal from an activity should behavior not improve.





General Guidelines for Students at St. Malachy's (Continued)

Expectations for Care of Facilities and School Materials

- 1. For *school assemblies*, classes are to go directly to the designated area accompanied by teachers. No bags are to be taken to the auditorium/gym.
- 2. *Care of school, furnishings, books.* Students are expected to take pride in their school. They should treat all school property entrusted to them with respect. Students are responsible for the cost of lost textbooks.
- 3. Students participating in athletics are required to pay an *athletic fee*. Any exceptions to this policy can be discussed with the Athletic Director.
- 4. Students are required to obtain permission prior to posting any *notices or announcements* regarding meetings or sporting events.
- 5. **Student Fees.** All students pay a total of \$50 each (or \$25 each semester) to the homeroom advisors during the month of September and February. Student fees include: ID Cards, Agendas, Locks, School Events, T-Shirts, Motivational Speakers, Entertainment for special occasions, Picnic in the park, Academic Awards celebration, and subsidies for the Machy Awards & Cabaret. There is an additional fee of \$120 for graduation to be paid by Grade 12 students by the end of April.
- 6. Students should keep their *lockers* locked at all times. Valuables should not be left in the changing rooms. Lock combinations should not be exchanged. Everyone must use a school issued lock. Students are responsible for the contents of their assigned locker.
 - Please Note: School officials have the right to search lockers at any time, and may enlist the use of search dogs if circumstances deem necessary.

Discipline Policy

All members of the St. Malachy's community are expected to behave in a manner that demonstrates and warrants respect. These behaviour standards (outlined on page 13-15) are for school, co-curricular, extra-curricular activities and travel to and from school. Students found in regular breach of our standards may be asked to sign a Behaviour Contract.

Anti-Harassment Policy

Our school should provide an environment where everyone feels safe, secure and free from discrimination regardless of race, age, gender, sexual orientation, appearance, popularity, ability, religion, creed, nationality or ethnic origin.





The Education Act states:

Student Responsibilities:

Students are to participate in learning opportunities to his or her potential.

Students are to accept increasing responsibility for their own learning.

Students are to complete assigned homework.

Students are to attend regularly and punctually.

Students are to contribute to a safe and positive learning environment.

Students are to accept responsibility for their conduct at school and on the way to and from school.

Students are to respect the rights of others and comply with all school policies.

Teacher Responsibilities:

Teachers are to encourage all students to work to their potential.

Teachers are to promote a positive environment in school and during co and extra curricular activities.

Teachers are to be the primary source of classroom discipline.

Teachers are to define and enforce consistently the basic code of acceptable behaviour.

Teachers are to ensure that students understand their expectations.

Teachers are to respect students and comply with all school policies.

Teachers are to strive for academic excellence while teaching the prescribed curriculum.

When the above behaviours are ignored or chronically disregarded, the teacher contacts the parent/guardian. The teacher informs the student that his or her behaviour has become a pervasive threat to the positive learning environment and a consequence for the unacceptable behaviour is imposed by the teacher. The discipline form is completed and returned to the appropriate vice principal.

The teacher informs the vice-principal of the student's continued disruptive behaviour. The administrator arranges a convenient time for the student, teacher, parent/guardian, guidance counselor and any other necessary personnel to meet to discuss interventions/consequences to student's disruptive behaviour.

The student is referred to the vice-principal where a final intervention is attempted. If unacceptable behaviour persists suspension will be imposed. The principal is apprised of all issues and may become involved at any stage of the process.

All incidents of belligerence, defiance, offensive language, inappropriate head coverings (both genders), snowball throwing, smoking in prohibited areas, and disrespect will be dealt with promptly and could result in suspensions ranging from one to five days.

Physical violence, criminal harassment, uttering of threats, vandalism, weapons, and the possession or use of alcohol or drugs will result in **IMMEDIATE SUSPENSION** from school.
